#### **TRANSKRYPCJA**

#### Zadanie 1.

There are a few origin stories for Valentine's Day, including the Roman fertility festival or the tale of the martyred St Valentine, but those stories omit around 1,500 years that have passed since. So, how did we get from loud Romans trying to have babies to modern Americans spending billions of dollars on valentine gifts and accessories?

Without a doubt, Valentine's Day has a well-deserved reputation for being too commercial. Surveys show that people in the U.S. spend almost \$24 billion each year. Many may think that the largest sums are spent on cards, but in fact, around 60% of spending goes on candy, preferably heart-shaped boxes of chocolates.

Geoffrey Chaucer, the English poet and author, in his late 14th century poem *Parliament of Foules* mentions Valentine's Day as the time when birds select their mates. Another commonly cited early reference is from the French Duke of Orleans' poems to his wife, written while he was imprisoned after the battle of Agincourt in 1415. In one he writes, "I am already sick of love, My very gentle Valentine." Even Shakespeare got in on it. In *Hamlet* (written around the turn of the 17th century) Ophelia sings, "Tomorrow is Saint Valentine's day, All in the morning betime, And I a maid at your window, To be your Valentine." And Valentine's Day wasn't just for poets. In February of 1477, Margery Brews of Norfolk sent a letter to her fiancé John Paston calling him "my right well-beloved valentine." The letter survived, and is now part of the British Library's collection, where it is currently the oldest known valentine written in English.

The tradition of sending valentines didn't become firmly established in the U.S. until the 1840s. It grew in popularity in the course of the decade, as stationers began to advertise their valentine cards in newspapers, which then also wrote about the customary practices of Valentine's Day.

And along with the rise of exchanging cards, complaints about the day have been going strong since at least 1847, when an American newspaper, the New York Daily Tribune, ran an article lamenting the loss of an old-fashioned, non-commercial day of love. They especially despised the idea of sending a valentine by post, seeing it as a tasteless joke that deprives the lovers of mystery and delicacy. Still, despite all that disdain, people loved Valentine's Day and the commercial holiday has only grown since.

#### Zadanie 2.

Basically, every state in the U.S. has its own unique set of odd symbols, customs and events. Some of these are fundamental to the state's identity, while others are just eccentric details that give the state a little extra flavour. Here are four of them:

In geography class, many students learn the shapes of states and territories to help remember their location. Michigan is known for having the shape of a hand or a glove. Because of this, when people in Michigan give directions or when they are asked by others where they live in the state, they simply put out their right hand and point to a spot on it.

People from New Orleans in Louisiana adore their king cake tradition. Every year, starting on Three Kings' Day and then throughout the Mardi Gras season, dozens of local bakeries pump out hundreds of king cakes topped with yellow, green, and purple sugar. They are the signature dessert at each party this time of year, and inside every cake, a tiny plastic figure of a baby is hidden. The lucky person who gets the slice of the cake with the baby tucked inside has to host the next party. So, if you decide to taste king cake, be sure that you are ready to throw a party where you will obviously need to serve the dessert.

Nathan's Famous is a restaurant on Coney Island, New York, that was started as a hot dog stand by a Polish immigrant. And yes, the original Coney Island restaurant is still there. What's more, it's home to the world's biggest hot dog-eating contest. But no one really knows how this event got started. According to some sources, it originated in 1916 from a bet between four immigrants. Each one claimed to be more patriotic than the other, so on the Fourth of July, they settled the argument by having a hot dog-eating competition at Nathan's stand.

Kentucky was originally a county of Virginia, which was established in 1776. Sometime later, in 1792, after numerous petitions sent to the government by citizens asking for statehood, Kentucky became America's 15th state. Why? The citizens of the western part of the state became frustrated that their state capital was so far-off, in the city of Richmond, and they wanted to have it nearer. And they got it!
